Historical Society Lists Mrs. Anderson As April Speaker

The Perinton Historical Society was pleased to list Roy Butterfield, Historian of Otsego County, as the April speaker on "Migrations into Western New York". Since retiring as principal of Benjamin Franklin High School, Mr. Butterfield has been able to devote more time to one of his special interests, the western movement of pioneers from New England into Central and Western New York. His ancestors settled near Cooperstown in 1790 at the place where he now lives.

He has worked out a series of maps showing the possible routes by natural waterways and overland by foot or oxcart. As early settlers of Perinton followed such courses, we are especially interested.

Unfortunately for him and for us, he recently suffered a partial stroke which makes it impossible for him to come to us.

To meet this emergency, Mrs. Carol Anderson has concentrated on completing the plans for "Main Street in Our Town", which have been growing from interviews and correspondence since September for the program which she expected to give in May. Some of the people working with her will give an account of the section of Main Street with which each is most familiar.

Main Street began with a footpath between the home of Martin Sperbeck, near Hulbert Ave. and the home of John Sperbeck on the site of the Municipal Building. The first settler within the present village limits was Peter Ripley who built a cabin near what is now the corner of North Main and Parca Ave. and a sawmill on Thomas Creek nearby.

Egypt, South Perinton, Perinton Center and Bushnell's Basin were important communities before Fairport. The dense swamp and flood lands along Thomas Creek making settlement undesirable until the area was drained by construction of the Erie Canal. An exhibit on "Main Street" will replace the ones on the Erie Canal and Genealogy, now at the Fairport Public Library.
