These projectors are made available in a six-county area by Rochester Consistory A.A.S.E. All that is necessary is a phone call to the Rochester Public Library's Reynolds Audio-Visual Department. Projectors and books on film are administered by the library. Members of the consistory deliver them to the home where they are needed and show how they are operated.

Poppy Poster Awards Made

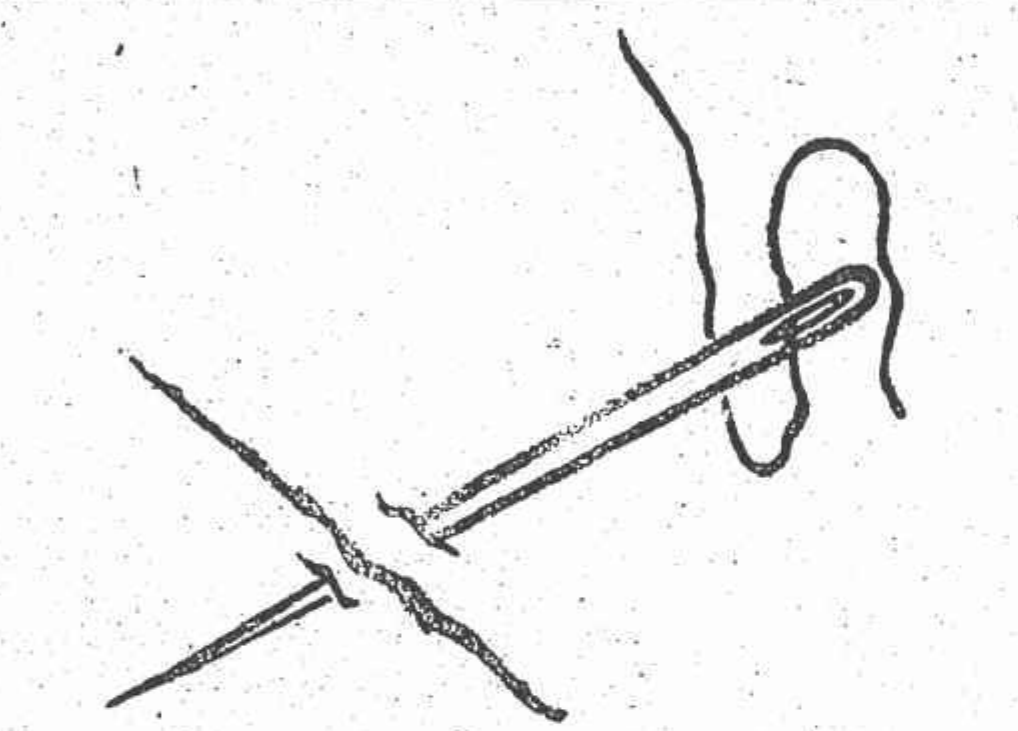
