Riflery Program Popular

More than 95 boys and girls are participating in the Junior Riflery Program, supervised by Police Chief, Tom Aldrich. Helping the Chief as leaders are: Mr. Ed. Bockus, Howard Cuykendall, and Bob Meyers.

Chief Aldrich says this activity is one where the little guys can compete against the big guys on even terms. Not only are the participants enjoying shooting, but learning consideration of others and good sportsmanship have been emphasized.

Each time a boy or girl comes, they shoot at least 3 rounds, meaning 3 shots at three different targets for a total of 15 rounds fired. Scores are computed by adding up the total score from each target. An average can be computed by totaling up all the scores and dividing by the numbers.

At the end of the season in April an awards banquet is being planned. Boys and girls who have fired more than 9 rounds will be eligible to receive a badge for the following: Girls - 30 to 34, Marksman 35 to 39, Sharpshooter 40 and over, Expert.
