# League of Women Voters Maps New Plan for Intensive Study of Today's Problems

# Broader Scope Arranged for Members

A NEW plan of intensive study of leading problems of the day will be inaugurated with the program for the coming season of the Monroe County League of Women Voters.

The schedule will call for the co-ordination of topics for study, enabling League members to participate in all phases of the organization's work, rather than in only a few as: was the case when the study group methed was employed.

The first problems to be taken ED will be the constitutional convention, and initial meeting in this project will be held at \$ B. m. Tuseday, Sept. 27, in the auditorium of the Rundel Memorial Building, Speaker will be Sybil Winternitz, who as chairman of the New York League of Women Voters' special committee for the constitutional convention has made an exhaustive study of the topic.

For six weeks following this meeting there will be intensive study of the proposed Constitution, terminated by another general meeting at which the subject again will be discussed by a competent speaker.

At the conclusion of the study of this topic, another important Phase of government will be studied in the same manner, although special interest groups will not discentinus mestings. The foreign policy group, one of the outstanding features of the League, will meet under the leadership of Mrs. E. P. Wight-

An extensive civic program will be included in this year's League activities. Under the direction of Mrs. Stafford Warren and Mrs. John Branch. The League members will edit "Vote," a publication which supplies nonpartima information concerning candidates and issues to be voted upon in the November balloting. Another civic enterprise included in the League's program is the compilation of the dates of meetings of interest to women, and their inclusion on the weakly Civic Calendar, Mrs. Arthur Reed will serve as chairman of the calendar committee this year.

Complete plans for the year will be outlined by Mrs. Leonard Jones, chalrman of the organisation, at a tea meeting to be held Monday, Sept. 26, in the Palm Room of the Hotel Seneca.
